The Academic Council Meeting held on 30<sup>th</sup> July 2024, after deliberations decided to reconsider the UG Social-Science Syllabus and recommended a signal paper in 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup> Semesters and two paper in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Semester having 5 credits per paper. In view of it the UG BOS meeting is recalled to re-frame the UG-SEP History Syllabus accordingly.

#### Resolution of UG BOS in History

The UG-SEP Syllabus in History was re-framed with single paper in 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> semesters and two papers in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> semesters.
